





# Newark charter schools post best student learning gains in the nation

# +73 DAYS

Students learn more in Newark public charter schools with gains of 48 additional days per year in reading and 73 additional days per year in math when compared to the state average accounting for student characteristics. #### FUNDING

#### **Public Charter Schools Are Deeply Underfunded**

More than 63,000 public school students in charter schools are not funded equitably in New Jersey. On average, public charter schools receive approximately \$4,000 less per student per year when compared to traditional district schools. Public charter schools also spend, on average, \$2,000 per student on facilities, and while the State has provided \$19 billion since 2001 to traditional district schools for school construction, public charter schools have received only \$44 million for minor building improvements.

#### AUTONOMY EMPOWERS CREATIVITY

Public charter schools have more autonomy over their budgets, curriculum, and personnel than traditional districts. Teachers at public charter schools are empowered to use **creative approaches** to meet the individual needs of students in their classroom. Public charter schools include incredibly **diverse learning models**, including:





Hoboken Dual Language Charter School provides an exceptional education in Spanish and English to develop engaged, well-rounded bilingual citizens with a global and multicultural perspective.

North Star Academy, part of the Uncommon Schools network, is creating a pipeline of college students to full-time staff teachers at the school. The program focuses on recruiting teachers of color by partnering with HBCUs across the country.

Unity Charter School in Morristown infuses Education for Sustainability throughout the school culture. Student agency drives critical thinking and inspires advocacy through a constructivist learning approach so that students graduate ready to change the world for the better.

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
