Math Growth: 50% of New Jersey's Top 10 Highest Performing Districts Are Public Charters, Though Charters Serve Less Than 5% of the State's Students

21 Public Charter Schools "Exceed Standards" on Student Growth Demonstrating Faster Recovery From Academic Pandemic Losses Compared To Rest of State

TRENTON, NEW JERSEY - April 8, 2024 – Last week, the New Jersey Department of Education (NJDOE) released annual <u>School Performance Reports</u>, which includes assessment, student growth, and accountability data for all public school districts in New Jersey. When evaluating student growth in mathematics, 5 of the top 10 highest performing districts are public charter schools, despite charter schools serving less than 5% of the entire public school population in New Jersey. In English language arts (ELA), 2 of the top 10 highest performing districts are public charters. Particularly noteworthy, College Achieve Paterson Charter School (CAPS Paterson), where 93% of students come from economically disadvantaged backgrounds, ranks top 10 in the state for both Math and ELA growth.

Student growth, as measured by median student growth percentiles (mSGP), takes into account academic starting points for individual students against their statewide academic peers. This data calculates growth year-over-year and is an important way to evaluate how schools are accelerating academic achievement gains at the student level in math and ELA.

The released data shows that 21 public charter schools "exceed standards" on student growth set by NJDOE's accountability framework, ranking in the top 15% of districts statewide. Public charter schools are accelerating learning for students faster than their statewide peers in under-resourced communities like Paterson, Newark, East Orange, Plainfield, Jersey City, Asbury Park, Perth Amboy.

These most recent assessment results continue to add <u>overwhelming evidence</u> that public charter schools are working for students and families in the Garden State. Black and Latino students enrolled in New Jersey's public charter schools outperform Black and Latino students in their comparative districts by 17 points in English language arts ELA and 10 points in mathematics on the New Jersey Student Learning Assessment. The data confirms that public charter schools continue to make significant student achievement gains for students of color in under-resourced communities throughout New Jersey.
